Recently retired Tyrone star Sean Cavanagh edged over a free from 45 metres, and seconds later Ryan Coleman hit a fine effort after a poor kickout.

That meant they held a 0-5 to 0-3 advantage after 20 minutes gone, while Sean Cavanagh's direct marker James Conlon was booked in further good news for the Mov men.

There were only two further scores in the final minutes of the half. Golloghy, who kicked four of Carrick-macross' five points, landed a free before Adam Currie gave the Moy a 0-6 to 0-4 lead with the last kick of the half.

Sean Cavanagh kicked a second free early in the second half before Carrickmacross grabbed a goal out of nowhere

Half-forward Declan Conrov em-

barked on a mazy run through the heart of the Moy defence, evading a clutch of defenders before calmly slotting the ball home.

The Monaghan side took the lead with Golloghly grabbed a free with 42 minutes, but they wouldn't score another point for the remainder of the game.

Time and time again, they either faltered against a resolute, well-manned Moy defence, or took the wrong option and scuffed the ball wide of the target.

And while Carrickmacross had the lion's share of possession, the Moy had enough class in attack to edge themselves back in front.

Harry Loughran, who kicked three points from play, scored the point of the day when he chipped the ball into his hands and moved into a shooting position before bagging an inspirational score.

Two minutes later, with six minutes of regulation time remaining, Sean Cavanagh was fouled 20 metres from goal. The ball was moved in closer, he tapped the ball over the bar, and try as they might, Carrickmacross couldn't muster a score for the remainder of the game.
